It combines first-rate scholarship by six experts on World War I with numerous photographs that graphically portray the horrors of trench warfare. The result is a concise yet authoritative history of the war as viewed by those who fought it.

This collection of essays describes how the soldiers fought, the weapons they used, and the losses they suffered. The war resulted in the demise of the German, Austrian, and Russian empires, and left a bitter legacy of international turmoil that set the stage for World War II only twenty years later.
